BUILDING AND GROUNDS ANNUAL REPORT 2016

Building and Grounds members: Elder Steve Norris, Mark Jones, Jim Norton, Troy Norris, John Vanderbeck and Wade Leighty.



This year has been a busy year, with not just one flood in the basement but two

and three. We had to hire SureClean twice, once to pump out the basement and clean all the floors and carpets and a second time to provide dryers and fans. We feel now, however, that we have this problem fixed. And we would like to thank everyone who could respond to our need for help removing water, moving



furniture and cleaning up after. This is what was done to eradicate this problem:

downstairs in big room by A&R.

- We had sump pumps installed on both ends of basement by Buchanan Mechanical. This has been a huge help.
- A back-flow valve on the drain in furnace room was installed insuring that we will not get water from overflowing sewage lines on large storms.
- A bulkhead was built by Mark Jones and Steve Norris over the

coal ramp entrance. This has stopped the drainage of water coming from the roof side on to the fire escape and from the parking lot flowing into the coal ramp.

In addition to these projects we kept up with general

maintenance.Lights were fixed in the office, third floor hall, and





- We received new cribs from Vincennes YMCA and shelving units for the upstairs classroom.
- We coordinated flood clean up and contacted the insurance Agency for full coverage. Many thanks to our Presbytery for the flood assistance, paying for our deductible out of the Disaster Relief Fund.
- We worked with SureClean to get things back to "normal" and coordinated plumbers' time and electrician with that of the cleanup.
- We had the carpet and floors washed by SureClean and had small carpets done by them at their facility.
- We got contractors' bids on bathroom upstairs for handicapped accessibility. We needed these to write a grant for handicapped accessibility upstairs.
- We also got bids on the possibility of a parking lot on the side of the church and an elevator to all three floors. To write the grant
- We got a Smock Grant for building campaign for \$25,000.00.

We still have some building projects needing our attention and look forward to next year:

- All the light bulbs will be replaced in the sanctuary in 2017. We have several out; it was thought that we could benefit from replacing all of them with LED lights which are energy efficient.
- We would like to scrape and paint radiators in the kitchen upstairs.
- Neaten up the front doors with painting over the door outside HHM entrance.
- We've noticed the stained glass over the front door is bowing out and needs repairing before it breaks. We have an estimate for replacing this glass with frosted glass to cut down the cost.
- We have visions for some esthetics by HHM entrance; we would like have a chair rail half wall put up so as not to see the peeling water damaged walls.
- Be watching for an outside landscape fall cleanup day. To be planned soon.
- We are looking forward to our new bathroom on the third floor starting this January 2017.
- We would like to install a middle rail at the front door of the fellowship hall to assist in getting up and down the stairs.

HELPING HANDS MINISTRY

• Mission Commission and many Westminster volunteers directed eight 2016 HELPING HANDS MINISTRY events on March 19, April 16, May 21, June 18, July 16, August 20, October 15, and November 19. Guest attendance consistently totaled 135-145 per month. The labor-intensive collection and display prep of donated inventory was accomplished with the help the many volunteers of the congregation and the ladies of Serenity House and Lighthouse Recovery gals. Heavy lifting tasks were cheerfully done by Lighthouse Recovery men.



• Commercial shelving units on casters were purchased with the PW Thank Offering Grant as HHM expanded into the Community Room. HHM is so worthwhile and blessed to help persons even in between our events in the 18 months of operation. Improvements are indicated and ongoing.

Offering only 1 large trash bag to each HHM family helped control the number of items taken by a few of the guests. An issue of some guests selling HHM items to buyers in Haiti surfaced. Volunteers more carefully monitored the number of items taken and put limits on items from the Child Room. Guests appreciate the quantity of clothing in the Adult Room; however, a major improvement would be



to have the thousands of articles of clothing on hangers. Chaotic shopping and volunteer efforts prevail when 20-30 guests are rummaging through tall stacks of folded clothes on many tables creating poor traffic flow. The inventory needs constant, inefficient refolding.

- A grant proposal submitted to the Washington Knights of Columbus, if awarded, will allow for the purchase of 20-30 commercial grade clothing racks on casters that will each hold 300-400 pounds of clothing. This could greatly enhance the sustainability of HHM by efficient facility utilization for HHM inventory display and storage while drastically reducing volunteer hours once HHM reorganization occurs. Ultimately, the HHM experience will be more user-friendly for all.
- HHM cards were distributed to businesses to spread the word for inventory donations.

GENERAL MISSION REPORT

- Change for Change: All money collected currently is used for meals for the LHR helpers.
- Feed My Sheep: Westminster pledges financial support annually, sponsored the Souper Bowl and Loaves & Fishes food collections plus provides a meal for 50 volunteers each September. The Reverse Offering food collection was not done this November, an oversight.
- Shoes were provided to fill an urgent need of two local students.
- The Baby Bottle Boomerang change collection helped support the Pregnancy Care Center.

Westminster Float: The Westminster Float for the Washington Bicentennial Parade was supported



by the WPC Session and Mission Commission with some expenses covered by the HHM grant. "Pioneers to the Present" helped spread our HHM theme of service to all.

Jubilee Christmas:

With First Christian as our partner church, Westminster hosted the 10th Annual Daviess County Jubilee

Christmas event serving 13 families selecting gifts for 27 children. Five families were Spanish speaking and felt so welcome with the cheerful help of four senior high school gals to interpret all evening. "Christmas cash" was gifted to the gals by WPC.
